Once the robot is built, programmers write code, plan the path, and use numerous problem solving skills allowing the the robot to complete the task, and ultmately, win. During the competition, robot "drivers" control the robot using a remote.

ElectroMedics Red Team member Annikka Rodriguez considers the scrimmage, an unofficial match, a learning experience, "We're proud of our accomplishments and hope to improve our robotics in the next few months." What is Día de Los Muertos?

Day of the Dead, more popularly know so as Dia de Los Muertos, is a Hispanic holiday celebrated in several Latin countries. Dia de Los Muertos takes place on November 1-2. This special holiday, however embraced in a certain way, coincides with the Catholic holiday known as All Saint's/Soul's Day. As the years have progressed Day of the Dead has become very well recognized by several new people and the act of honoring passed love ones has created a sense of unity.

The belief surrounding Dia de Los Muertos is that the gates of Heaven open at midnight on October 31. The opening of the gates allow the spirits of deceased children to reunite with their families for 24 hours. This reunion gives the family a sense of peace and brings a lot of joy to the kids. On November 2, the spirits of passed adults come to enjoy the celebration prepared for them by their family. Some of the festivities that occur during these celebrations are parades with music, prayer services, alter preparations, and a large amount of eating.

The alters for Day of the Dead are garnished with things such as candles, flowers, fruits, nuts, tortillas, mole, and the holidays signature bread, pan de muerto. The alter also has sodas, waters, and hot chocolate to ease the visiting spirits. Along with all the food and beverages the burning of sage is also practiced. The celebration is purely a tribute to loved ones who are no longer physically here.

The afternoon of November 2, the alters at the celebration are taken to the cemetery. The people clean the tombs, play cards, and listen to music, the celebration I still continuing. Families are reminiscing on the memories of the dead whom they loved very much. The holiday of celebrating Dia de Los Muertos keeps families close and showcases one of the most important traditions in the Latin community.

AV Hospital Measure H Passes

On Election Day, November 7, Los Angeles County voters passed Measure H, which will result in Antelope Valley Hospital being owned by a "public benefit non-profit corporation, pursuant to state law," according to the County Clerk's website. The measure passed with 73.26% of the vote in its favor.

The hospital will be under the jurisdiction of a non-profit board of nine members. According to proponents on avmeasureh. org, funds collected will be invested into the community. Nurses and doctors will be able to receive better training through the redirection of funds. The hospital aims to provide better pay and services to attract and maintain new employees. Finally, no new fees or taxes will be added to residents as a result of this change.

The website ballotpedia.org, citing the Los Angeles County Counsel, states that this lease of ownership will be effective immediately after the measure is passed, and will expire on November 7, 2048 (thirty years later) if not ended sooner.

The National Anthem: A History

On the stormy night of September 13, 1814, the entire Britsh armada gave Fort McHenry an ultimatum: take down the flag and surrender or we will take the flag down for you. The British armada then proceeded to fire shells at the Fort for 25 hours. About a week earlier, Francis Scott Key boarded a British flagship in order to free his arrested friend. He was successful, but the British could not let them off the ship because they had found out their plan to fire on the Fort. Key watched the attack from about 8 miles away. 25 hours later, on September 14, he saw the American Flag still standing. He noticed it was at a very odd angle and once let off the flagship went to investigate why that was. He found out that during the night people, both military and civilian, died trying to hold up the flag so as not to surrender to the British. Men and women gave their lives to hold the flag up, the only thing holding up the flag after the attack was their dead bodies. Almost two centuries later, our flag is still standing.

Catholic Hierarchy By Caitlin Chan and Becky Singleton

In the Catholic hierarchy, the authority mainly derives from the bishops, while priests and deacons serve as their assistants in specific parishes. In thinking about the hierarchy in governmental terms, priests are the mayors and the parishes are the cities. The archbishops are essentially the governors in charge of priests in specific regions.

As of December 31, 2014, the Catholic Church consisted of 2,998 dioceses, each overseen by a bishop. Approximately 22% of all parishes do not currently have a pastor and 3,485 parishes are entrusted to a deacon.

In charge of all the bishops is the Pope, chosen by Cardinals, who represent different countries and continents.

Alex Bregman was hitting for the Astros while Rich Hill pitching. Bregman roped a line drive to center field and center fielder Chris Taylor was unable to come up with the ball allowing a run to score for the Astros. Fast forward to the bottom of the fifth inning with Joc Pederson coming up to the plate for the Dodgers and Justin Verlander pitching for the Astros. Verlander delivers the pitch and Joc Pederson buries it deep into the right field bleachers to tie the game up at 1-1. Move on to the bottom of the sixth inning Justin Verlander is still throwing a great game but he starts to crumble here. Verlander allowed a two out walk to Chris Taylor. He grounded a ball back up the middle and allowed a run to score making the score a one run game at 3-2. In the top of the ninth inning Kenley Jansen had the opportunity to end the game and give the Dodgers the win but Astros hitter Martin Gonzalez did not let him. Gonzales took one deep into the center field bleachers tying the game up at 3-3 in the ninth inning. The Dodgers did not score in the bottom of the ninth inning. This caused the game to go into extra innings. The Astros hit two back to back home runs in the top of the tenth inning giving the Astros a 5-3 lead over the Dodgers. In the bottom of the tenth inning the Dodgers rallied back and tied the game up at 5-5. In the top of the eleventh inning Cameron Maybin hit a leadoff single to start things off for the Houston Astros. This brings up George Springer to the plate and he hits a ball over the right field fence causing the Astros to be on top again 7-5. The Dodgers tried to tie the game up in the bottom of the eleventh but failed to do so. The end score was 7-6 Astros on top.

Bishop Joseph Brennan visited Paraclete on November 1 to celebrate the All Saints Day Mass. He is the auxiliary bishop of the San Fernando region in the Archdiocese of Los Angeles, of which encompasses Paraclete.

Brennan felt especially called to the priesthood after coming out of high school. His uncle was a priest in Los Angeles for over 50 years, and a role model to Brennan. A vibrant Irish priest at Brennan's parish also inspired him. In his freshman year in college, Brennan felt

compelled to talk to someone about his calling. Directly after talking to the campus minister for about an hour, Brennan assisted in the mass service. The readings, "hit me right between the eye(s)," the other priest considered. Gresham year in college, campus minister suggested helping with mass, the readings "hit me right between the eye: Ephesians 4, "I plead with you as a prisoner of the Lord, to live a life worthy of the call you have received." The Gospel was of Jesus calling the tax collector Matthew to follow him. Brennan reflected, "It answered a lot of my objections because I thought I wasn't good enough, holy enough, smart enough to be a priest." In a show of his humility, Brennan also added, "That's all true by the way. But it doesn't matter to God, He chooses us anyway."

Brennan's message to Paraclete students on All Saints Day is that all are called to holiness. "In spite of ourselves, we really (would) do all of ourselves a favor if we'd respond to that call to holiness because you can't get out of it."





